Reading is something that is very dear to me and I place a huge emphasis on it at school. I think the teachers must be sick of hearing this from me but, without reading, a student will struggle with their writing, maths and most other school subjects. Our recent testing has shown that while most students (not all) are doing okay with their reading, as a general statement, they are having difficulty with their comprehension. This is the ability to understand what they have read and to draw direct or indirect information from it.

I often tell my students that reading is much like walking or kicking a footy. It's



something you need to practise at to get better. So please encourage daily reading and ask your child many questions about their reading as they read to you. This creates purpose in reading and will help them decipher and understand information while showing your deep interest in what they do.

Children are learning the letter sounds and using these to form simple words. We play a lot of games and use different materials to make learning fun.










Blue Wren Class - Mrs Morgan

the design cycle and complete a task from idea to prototype including some research, inclusion work and then building with either Lego or craft objects to create their own playground designs. This was the perfect taster before our GOSH excursion in Week 4. The Great South Showcase was held at Mandurah Baptist College and was a full-day conference including keynote presentations, industry demonstrations, live panel interactions, innovation challenges and interactive technology talks. The students were awesome all day, listening to some really interesting presentations (including one on Quantum Computing!!)

We rounded it out with our assembly dedicated to the biggest sporting event in the world! Our Olympic love has spread to Talk 4 Writing where we have been focusing on Biography writing. After the Year 3/4s had finished learning their model text "Who Was the Real Troll of the Bridge?" and the



5/6s learned about Usain Bolt, both groups have begun writing their own biographies on an Australian Olympic star. The Aussie girls have really shone with the 5/6s, with the class each choosing to focus on a different female athlete! Yeah The Girls!


